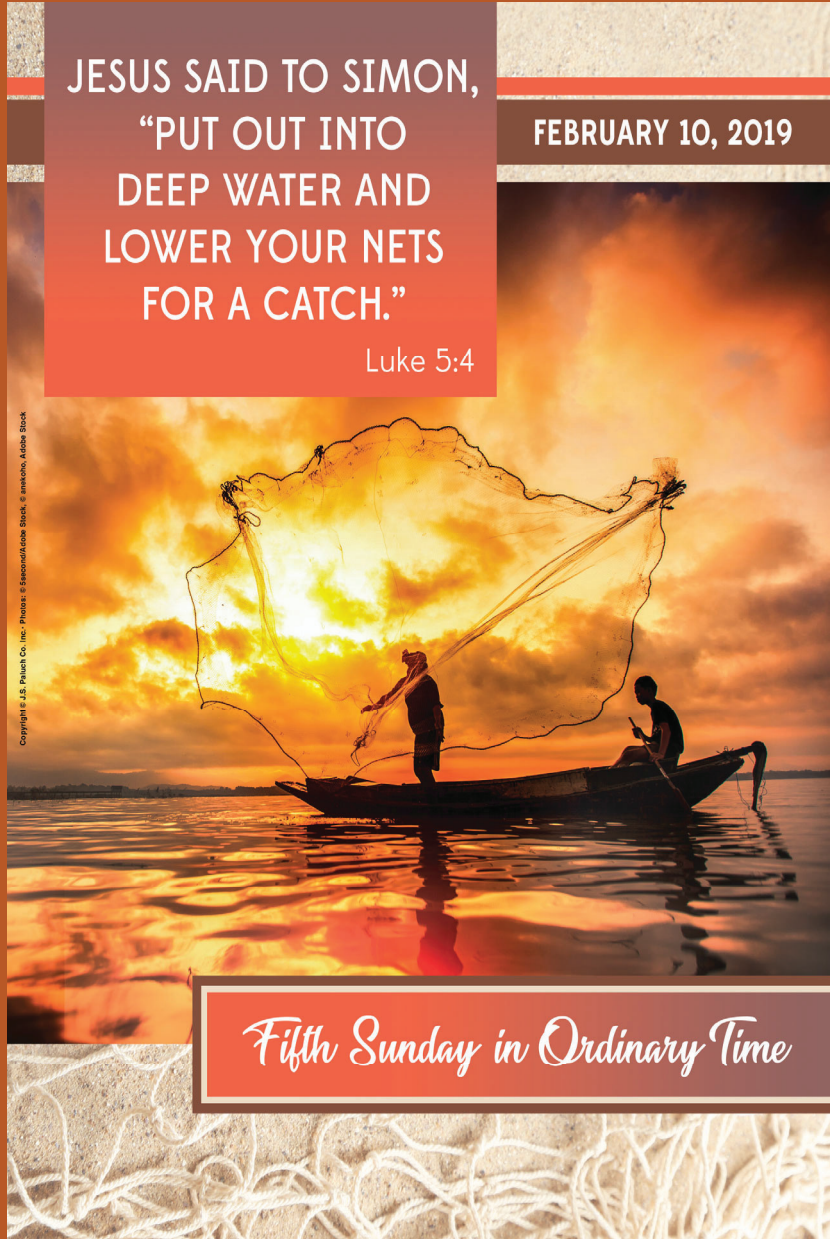

Leading up to our Cardinal's Renew My Church decision for our area I found myself reflecting, more and more, on the importance of and the distinction between "React and Respond". They both relate to how we face up to the unexpected events in life. They also determine the quality of any given outcome so we are wise to pay attention to how, when, and why we react or respond.

There are, of course, many moments in daily life that are inconsequential and it doesn't really matter how we decide. Much of our usual routines are just that, routines. It doesn't take much effort to decide and we don't put much thought into many of our choices. Coffee or tea? Pepsi or Coke? Who cares? These are things of personal preference and don't demand all of our mental power. But when we enter into the areas of life that really matter our mental and emotional posture- react or respond- make a huge difference.

I've been to many meetings and gatherings since the RMC decision and I share in the disappointment and sadness so many of our parishioners feel upon hearing about our parish's future. As I reflect upon the entire process I recognize more keenly the errors which the pastors encountered and which we made along the way. There were structural issues with the parts of the process: The timing could have been better thought out and the initial configuration of parishes arranged differently. The key players could have been better prepared to ensure that everyone was using the same language and agreed upon the "rules of engagement". But, for me, the single largest obstacle was that- as a group- we reacted to superficial noise and never allowed ourselves to respond to the invitation presented to us and our people.

A reactionary mindset is reflexive and not reflective. It is quick to decide and is instinctively protective of what is known, showing little concern for what needs to be or what could be possible. Athletes on a playing field are trained to react. They look to identify the movement of the opponent and quickly take a course of action to impede their process and promote their own goals. The die is cast, so to speak, and there isn't much room for something different.

In order to properly respond to any significant life event, the people involved must first agree that change will be necessary even if the outcome isn't exactly clear. A responsive mode of operation recognizes that change requires a series of progressions acting in harmony over a longer period of time. Athletes who make it to the Super Bowl don't do so overnight with one reactive decision. Their God-given talent and instinct needed intentional development. It took years of learning and unlearning in order to become someone they weren't when they began. They had to learn how to respond properly.

Our scripture today gives us some insight into the strange relationship between "React and Respond". Like the prophet Jeremiah last week Isaiah's reaction to seeing the presence of God, while understandable, wasn't of much use. God didn't appear to the prophet in all God's glory to impress the poor guy. God made Himself known so that Isaiah could respond in kind and give his whole self to the invitation to serve the Lord. God didn't let his chosen prophet waste away in his fearful reaction. God took the thoughtful steps necessary to ensure that Isaiah could be what God created him to be.

Jesus acted in a similar way with the men who would be his Apostles and disciples. They had prejudged the situation and sized up this man from Nazareth; Jesus, a carpenter. What could he possibly know about the fishing profession? Their initial reaction was rather "ho-hum" and didn't expect much. Like God the Father, Jesus the Son took the necessary steps to awaken within his new friend's hearts and minds that were capable of a wholehearted response. Jesus knew what his group of brothers and sisters would be facing in the future. He needed them to more than sounding boards. He needed their full attention and participation.

God calls us in many different ways. God calls us because God believes in us and knows what we are truly capable of is we trust His promptings. Our good Lord leads us along the way so that we can grow and mature and share in His mission. God knows that we are more than a collection of reactionary impulse. He knows we are able to respond in love, mercy, patience, and strength. We can't help but react to new situations but we can choose how we will respond. Peace. Fr. Peter

Antes de la decisión Renew My Church de nuestro Cardenal para nuestra área, me encontré reflexionando, cada vez más, sobre la importancia y la distinción entre "Reaccionar y responder". Ambos se relacionan con cómo afrontamos los eventos inesperados en la vida. También determinan la calidad de cualquier resultado dado, por lo que debemos prestar atención a cómo, cuándo y por qué reaccionamos o respondemos.

Hay, por supuesto, muchos momentos en la vida cotidiana que son intrascendentes y realmente no importa cómo decidamos. Gran parte de nuestras rutinas habituales son solo eso, rutinas. No toma mucho esfuerzo decidirlo y no pensamos mucho en muchas de nuestras elecciones. ¿Café o té? ¿Pepsi o Coca Cola? ¿A quien le importa? Estas son cosas de preferencia personal y no exigen todo nuestro poder mental. Pero cuando entramos en las áreas de la vida que realmente importan, nuestra postura mental y emocional, reaccionar o responder, hacen una gran diferencia.

He asistido a muchas reuniones y reuniones desde la decisión de RMC y comparto la decepción y la tristeza que muchos de nuestros feligreses sienten al escuchar sobre el futuro de nuestra parroquia. Al reflexionar sobre todo el proceso, reconozco más claramente los errores que los pastores encontraron y que cometimos en el camino. Hubo problemas estructurales con las partes del proceso: el momento podría haber sido mejor pensado y la configuración inicial de las parroquias organizadas de manera diferente. Los actores clave podrían haber estado mejor preparados para garantizar que todos estuvieran usando el mismo idioma y acordaran las "reglas de compromiso". Pero, para mí, el mayor obstáculo fue que, como grupo, reaccionamos ante el ruido superficial y nunca nos permitimos responder a la invitación que nos presentaron a nosotros y a nuestra gente.

Una mentalidad reaccionaria es reflexiva y no reflexiva. Es rápido de decidir y protege instintivamente de lo que se conoce, mostrando poca preocupación por lo que debe ser o lo que podría ser posible. Los atletas en un campo de juego están entrenados para reaccionar. Buscan identificar el movimiento del oponente y rápidamente toman un curso de acción para impedir su proceso y promover sus propios objetivos. El dado está echado, por así decirlo, y no hay mucho espacio para algo diferente.

Para responder adecuadamente a cualquier evento importante de la vida, las personas involucradas deben primero acordar que el cambio será necesario incluso si el resultado no es exactamente claro. Un modo de operación receptivo reconoce que el cambio requiere una serie de progresiones que actúen en armonía durante un período de tiempo más largo. Los atletas que llegan al Super Bowl no lo hacen de la noche a la mañana con una decisión reactiva. Su talento e instinto dado por Dios necesitaban un desarrollo intencional. Tomó años de aprendizaje y desaprendizaje para convertirse en alguien que no eran cuando empezaron. Tenían que aprender a responder adecuadamente.

Nuestra escritura de hoy nos da una idea de la extraña relación entre "Reaccionar y responder". Al igual que el profeta Jerimiah la semana pasada, la reacción de Isaías al ver la presencia de Dios, aunque comprensible, no fue de mucha utilidad. Dios no se apareció al profeta en toda la gloria de Dios para impresionar al pobre hombre. Dios se dio a conocer a Sí Mismo para que Isaías pudiera responder con amabilidad y entregarse a la invitación para servir al Señor. Dios no dejó que su profeta elegido se desperdiciara en su temerosa reacción. Dios tomó los pasos necesarios para asegurar que Isaías pudiera ser lo que Dios creó para que fuera. Jesús actuó de manera similar con los hombres que serían sus apóstoles y discípulos. Habían prejuzgado la situación y evaluaron a este hombre de Nazaret; Jesús, un carpintero. ¿Qué podría él saber sobre la profesión pesquera? Su reacción inicial fue más bien "aburrida" y no esperaba mucho. Al igual que Dios Padre, Jesús el Hijo tomó las medidas necesarias para despertar en los corazones y las mentes de su nuevo amigo que eran capaces de una respuesta sincera. Jesús sabía a qué se enfrentaría su grupo de hermanos y hermanas en el futuro. Los necesitaba más que tablas de resonancia. Necesitaba toda su atención y participación.

Dios nos llama de muchas maneras diferentes. Dios nos llama porque Dios cree en nosotros y sabe de lo que somos realmente capaces si confiamos en sus incitaciones. Nuestro buen Señor nos guía en el camino para que podamos crecer, madurar y compartir su misión. Dios sabe que somos más que una colección de impulsos reaccionarios. Él sabe que somos capaces de responder con amor, misericordia, paciencia y fortaleza. No podemos evitar reaccionar ante situaciones nuevas, pero podemos elegir cómo responderemos. Paz. P. Pedro
